AUTHOR INTERVIEW - KAREN CIOFFI

I met children's author, Karen Cioffi, in cyber-space a little over a year ago and have remained in touch personally and through the CWCC since. Come along and learn more about Karen's writing career and the obstacles she has had to overcome to reach her success. I'm sure you will be in awe and will walk away inspired.

DMc: What or whom inspired you to start writing for children?

KC: I always wrote poetry, but when I was expecting my first child I began to focus on writing poems for children. After my daughter was born, I composed Day's End Lullaby. Then, another child and life lead me away from writing until my younger daughter, Robyn, was getting her Masters in Children's Literature. This sparked my writing again and I took up the pen to write children's stories.

DMc: What is the most valuable piece of writing advice you have ever received?

KC: There are actually two "most valuable" pieces of writing advice I ve received:

- ✓ Don't judge yourself based on other writers' accomplishments.
- ✓ Don't give up PERSEVERE! It's not always the most gifted writer who succeeds; it's the one who perseveres.

DMc: What has been your most memorable experience in your writing career?

KC: Wow, until recently I would have no problem pinpointing this – it would be the Muse Online Writers Conference of 2008. It was my first conference. It was completely overwhelming, but I learned so much; it was definitely a turning point for me. A workshop in this conference was the catalyst that motivated me to create VBT – Writers on the Move. Denise Cassino gave the workshop and discussed virtual tours. She suggested the attendees get together and create one. I initiated the process and rather than a one-time tour, I created a group for authors to cross-promote using ongoing virtual tours and other promotional strategies.

But, this month, so much has happened that I have to add three more memorable experiences, and honors: Lea Schizas joined the DKV Writing 4 U team (as the professional editor); my blog site, Karen and Robyn Writing for Children, was added to Sylvan Dell Publishing's Website Blogroll; and my fantasy chapter manuscript was accepted to be read by a publisher. Even if nothing comes of the last one, it's a wonderful learning experience and gives me a little more confidence that others see what I see in the story.

Okay, let me counteract that last questionably negative sentence: they love my ms...they love my ms. \odot

Oh, one more memorable experience that just happened is the creator of Lullaby Link (a site about and for Iullabies) found my book, Day's End Lullaby, through a Google search. She

contacted me, reviewed my book, and created a video for the Lullaby Link site and one for YouTube. I've wanted to get the lullaby on a video and amazingly, now it is!

DMc: What kind of obstacles or challenges have you experienced as a children's writer?

KC: The first obstacle I've encountered is the learning and research curve. Writing for children has many more rules, tricks, strategies, and so on than other writing. It took me a long time to get a sense of writing appropriately for my intended age group. What I mean by that is using the correct words, situations and actions. I work on this constantly. I do have a great children's writing coach, Suzanne Lieurance (The Children's Writing Coaching Club), who helps tremendously in this area.

The next obstacle would be my focus. I've mentioned to some that I'm focused on being scattered. This keeps me from submitting my manuscripts as I should which is a big NO-NO.

DMc: Do you dedicate your writing sessions to one manuscript at a time or do you work on several projects at a time?

KC: I have several projects going at once. I currently have three picture books (one is collaboration with my daughter), one chapter book, and one middle grade book. In addition to this, I write articles and publish them with Suite101, AssociatedContent, and EzineAritlces, and maintain four blogs.

DMc: You recently were bestowed the honor of being named to the <u>Sylvan Dell Publishing Website Blogroll</u>. Was this an unexpected honor or do you write for them? Please explain how you made this prestigious list.

KC: Yes, this was a very unexpected honor...I'm still smiling. It's amazing how some things happen: I'm a reviewer for BookPleasures.com. I reviewed one of Sylvan Dell's new books, What's New at the Zoo? An Animal Adding Adventure. Sara Dobie, from Sylvan Dell, remembered me and this particular review and was kind enough to add me to the blogroll.

DMc: Please share with us your inspiration behind Day's End Lullaby co-authored with Robyn Feltman. What was your collaboration process like?

KC: My firstborn, as a baby, woke during the night a lot, so I composed a bedtime lullaby that I sang to her as I paced up and down the hallway trying to get her back to sleep. I sang the lullaby to my second child and all the other little ones that came along in the family. It became a family lullaby that actually helped by soothing babies to sleep. When my first grandson was born, Robyn talked me into turning the lullaby into a children's bedtime picture book. She believed it would be a wonderful book that we could share with others. Since the text was already written, we collaborated on the illustrations to be used, colors, cover, and so on. We also decided to include the sheet music to the lullaby – it's the last two pages of the book. It was a fun experience working with my daughter on this project together.

Since having Multiple Sclerosis, and knowing limitations and health possibilities, I also wanted to create the book for my family and the next generations. This is what prompted us to self-publish rather than taking the traditional publishing road.

DMc: Please share with us your current Works-in-Progress.

KC: I have a fantasy chapter book. It's about a young boy who longs to learn magic and is based on an ancient Chinese tale. I have the beginning of a middle grade science-fiction (or it may end up a chapter book also) story about boys lost in space. I also have two children's picture books, or children's magazine articles – I'm not sure which I'll go for. One is about young superheroes, and the other is about a young boy learning the importance of positive thinking, along with practice. I also have a couple of other children's articles that I'm working on. And, I have the picture book I'm working on with my daughter.

DMc: What can we expect from you in the future?

KC: Well, I recently created a health site dedicated to Multiple Sclerosis, Chronic Fatigue Syndrome, Fibromyalgia, Anxiety, and Clinical Depression.

So, now in addition to writing articles about children's writing and marketing, I write about these health topics.

I will also continue to write for children. I favor picture books and chapter book lengths and will probably focus on those.

DMc: You are a member of the Children's Writing Coaching Club. For those of our readers not familiar with Suzanne Lieurance's club please describe what a new member can expect from it.

KC: I've been a member of the Children's Writing Coaching Club for around a year and a half - I have to say it is a great club. It delves into writing children's books as well as writing for children's magazines: the techniques, tips, the dos and don'ts, the tricks, it's all explained. Members are given monthly assignments geared to get your work published. There is also a weekly critique session in which you submit a manuscript or article and Suzanne personally critiques it for you. In addition to this there are weekly teleclasses that teach you the ins and outs of writing for children. All this along with Suzanne's knack for motivating and encouraging her members helps you learn and hone your craft. My writing has improved greatly with Suzanne's guidance and I continue to improve and benefit from this club. I don't think there is another club that offers so much for such a miniscule price per month.

DMc: A signature request I like to ask every author, illustrator, editor, etc., I interview is for the individual to share with us a tidbit from their lives that the reader will find either humorous or surprising. Karen, can you please share one with us?

KC: In my life I've played: violin, harmonica, accordion, piano, guitar and banjo. I played them well enough at the time, but I never mastered any of them.

AUTHOR INTERVIEW - DORIT SASSON

Dorit and I first met through the CWCC over two years ago and I've watched and cheered with admiration in all she has achieved. With her background as an ESL teacher, Dorit readily shares her expertise through teaching and writing. Making sure each ESL student has the specific tools in achieving their success both within the classroom and in society. Come along and learn more about Dorit and her well accomplished career.

DMc: You have written articles for a variety of journals, magazines, newsletters, and ezines like Reading Today, Essential Teacher, Teacher and Principal Quarterly, the Internet TESL Journal, WAHM Online, and many others. What do you find the most challenging in keeping your approach fresh and exciting?

DS: One fundamental challenge is picking a topic that my primary audience that is, teachers, seem to be struggling with the most and then write in an attention grabbing and practical way. I'm always looking how to turn serious classroom and teaching issues into simple and sometimes, lighthearted articles that are easy and fun for teachers to read.

DMc: You are a teacher at CCAC Allegheny Community College. Please describe the class structure for your reading and writing classes.

DS: In my ESL classes, Students spend a lot of time using English to communicate and interact for a specific purpose. I always combine speaking with one of the other primary skills of reading and writing. Yesterday for example, the students did a role play of "mock interview" in preparation for an information seeking interview. They will then write their findings in the form of an essay.

Students often work in pairs or in small groups in order to create a classroom community that reflects the globality of learning English.

DMc: What or whom inspired you to become a children's writer.

DS: I've always been taken to reading children's literature especially Charlotte's Web and the All of a Kind Family series. I think after years of reading children's books, I figured I had enough to say and well, write my own. It just was a natural part of the writing journey. I

just thought I'd experiment with writing for children since my focus is for that population anyway.

DMc: How have you combined your experiences as a classroom teacher with your writing?

DS: Since my niche is teaching ESL, I primarily target that part of the educational market. For example, I take many classroom scenarios and issues teachers seem to struggle with the most and turn them into short articles for my blog site, conduct interviews with other professionals and experts in the field, write tip booklets, create podcasts and teleseminars. Before writing anything, I always look at the needs of teachers and what they're struggling with. I share my own classroom experiences on my blog site and in my weekly ezine. I also focus on larger writing projects such as resource books for teachers.

DMc: What is your biggest challenge in juggling all your responsibilities?

DS: The biggest challenge I find is transitioning from the "teaching hat" to the "writing hat" and carving enough time out of the time to accomplish the tasks without falling on the expense of the other. It's an ongoing challenge.

I am also my own "band." I do everything from marketing to writing. The non-writing activities often eat out of my writing time. Sometimes I wish I had a virtual assistant!

DMc: You are the founder and director of the New Teacher Resource Center. Please share with our readers as to what they can expect when visiting http://newteacherresourcecenter.com

DS: The New Teacher Resource Center is an online support site that provides teachers (with the emphasis on new teachers) with resources, tips and teaching strategies – anything they need to jumpstart their careers and become more confident in the classroom. Teachers can find quick tips on parent conferencing or lesson planning. If they need more expert advice, they can turn to Professor Diane Barone and learn how to teach English language learners more effectively or get some hands-on classroom management tips from Professor Howard Seeman.

There are many free resources such as sample teaching resumes, lesson planning charts and links to other educational and teaching resources. There is also a children's writer section including several short recordings from Suzanne Lieurance.

DMc: Through your website you offer a FREE e-book entitled, Taking Charge in the Classroom. How is this resource beneficial to teachers?

DS: The FREE e-book Taking Charge in the Classroom is a handbook of resources and tips on classroom management and lesson planning. Each article gives teachers tips on what they can do to become a more effective lesson planner and classroom manager by creating a classroom management plan that works and speaks to them.

DMc: Please share with us your current Works-in-Progress.

DS: Well, I just finished a tips booklet, "Yes! You Can Teach Your K-12 English language learners successfully!" and it is available for downloading at http://www.NewTeacherResourceCenter.com and http://www.tipsbooklets.com/

I also have a book manuscript under discussion with Scholastic entitled: Helping ESL Students in Grades 1-2: Activities to Increase Word Recognition, Reading Comprehension and Oral Fluency in Just One Month which I collaborated with my coauthor.

And finally, I have a children's picture book under discussion (My first one!) entitled, The Hummus Party with the multi-cultural publisher, Kane-Miller.

I'm really excited about the prospects of these three projects and what they can bring.

DMc: What can we expect from you in the future?

DS: I'm working on my second tip booklet for teachers and getting ready to submit a short story for a fiction contest about my journey coming to the United States after living in I srael for many years.

I'm also in the process of finishing another ebook, Tips and Tricks to Survive and Thrive in the Classroom: Practical activities and tips for teachers made easy, which consists of 10 special reports on a different area of teaching.

I'm also working on a second picture book for children.

DMc: You are a member of the Children's Writing Coaching Club. What led you to joining? What would you like to share with someone contemplating in joining?

DS: I felt I needed the online support and feedback from a writing group in order to move my children's writing to the next level. Besides benefiting from the already low price, I found a home with other talented writers.

A writing group is an excellent way to receive support and feedback from other writers. Although writers can be lonely people, they still need the camaraderie and support to keep at the writing especially during hard times. Rejection is part of the business.

DMc: A signature request I like to ask every author, illustrator, editor, etc., I interview is for the individual to share with us a tidbit from their lives that the reader will find either humorous or surprising. Dorit, can you please share one with us?

KC: After serving in the I sraeli army as an officer and living on a kibbutz in I srael for 19 years, I returned to the United States in 2007 with my husband and young son. I'm originally from New York City (I live in Pittsburgh now) and the multi-cultural hats I wear also feed into my writing and teaching. I feel I can adjust to anything! My students look at

me like I'm crazy when I share this tidbit with them and I always wonder why! Living in I srael is a lot safer than living in the U.S.

AUTHOR INTERVIEW - KATHY STEMKE

Kathy and I first met online and at the CWCC and now I'm proud to say we are both "Angels" of Guardian Angel Publishing. It always amazes me how friendships come full circle. Kathy combines her teaching background and writing in a unique fashion bringing it all alive in Rhythm and Movement. Be sure to have your dancing shoes on, since you will be moving and grooving as you learn more about Kathy.

DMc: Please share with us your background before becoming a children's writer.

KS: I have always had a passion for the arts and all things creative. I've been a dancer and choreographer since my college days at Southern Connecticut State University. With a background in physical education and early childhood education I've taught in public and private school for many years.

With graduate coursework from New York Institute of Technology and Columbia University in dance and communication arts, television production, I created evangelistic presentations at New Covenant Church in New York. These presentations included, dance, music, drama, narration, computerized slides and lighting. I choreographed the dance and took most of the pictures. Sometimes I combined dance with slides. I wrote the narration and the skits as well. I earned a Bachelors of Science degree in Christian ministry at Covenant Life Seminary.

In 2000, I became a full time tutor. In fact, I still teach one day a week. I've taught courses in creative writing, English, math and SAT preparation. I am now a contributing editor for The National Writing for Children's Center.

DMc: What lead you to becoming a children's writer.

KS: I'm a teacher at heart, and I always want children to learn something new about life and their environment. After publishing several articles, I created my blog, Educationtipster, to share teaching tips with parents and teachers. My first book, Moving Through All Seven Days, was an outgrowth of my blog. I found that teachers wanted more movement oriented books and activities. That's what got me writing children's books with an emphasis on action and movement.

DMc: You offer a newsletter entitled, Movement & Rhythm Newsletter. For those of our readers not familiar with it please describe what they can expect from it. And where they can subscribe to it?

KS: My free monthly newsletter is full of movement exploration, stories, games, songs, poems, and activities with a focus on movement. These activities can be used to teach language arts, math and science. I also include book reviews, lists of teaching resources, and interviews with great children's authors. Just go to my blog to sign up.

DMc: Please share with us your inspiration behind Moving Though All Seven Days.

KS: There are many books about the days of the week, but this book has rhymes that teach children how to spell each day. This book inspires movement as children learn about the days of the week. The activities at the end of the book are designed to reinforce the concepts as well as give impetus to movement exploration.

DMc: What tip would you offer to parents dealing with a reluctant reader?

KS: Find books that interest your child and are the correct reading level for him/her now. The grade level is only a guide. Make sure your child is below his/her frustration level. Include hands on, active games about the books to keep your child engaged in reading.

DMc: You publish a blog entitled, Educationtipster at http://educationtipster.blogspot.com. What can your visitors expect from you on a weekly basis.

KS: My movement activities, book reviews, and parenting tips will help parents and teachers teach children phonics, math, writing and science! Each month I feature an author and his/her books.

DMc: Please share with us your current Works-in-Progress.

KS: Trouble on Earth Day is a fun and educational story about a Squirrel who helps a new friend while learning about recycling. This book is a one stop shopping value for parents and teachers because it is full of great recycling ideas, craft projects, and worksheet pages.

DMc: What can we expect from you in the future?

KS: I plan to write a series of picture books with environmental themes. Trouble on Earth Day is almost ready to be released. I recently completed the second book in this series titled, Wonderful Water Explorers. This book opens up conversation about water preservation with a story of a thirsty bluebird named Charlie, who has lost his ability to sing due to a lack of water. When he meets up with his squirrel friend, Shelby, they set out on an adventure to find fresh drinking water and to bring back singing to the forest. I'll be writing a third book about air pollution.

Guardian Angel Publishers will publish my book titled Sh, Sh, Sh, Will the Baby Sleep? In this action packed story a "superhero" named Zachary must keep his new baby sister asleep. In the process he finds out that he loves her very much. This book and the activities included in the back focus on teaching children about consonant blends. Teachers will love it.

I've also started my first YA fantasy novel. Although I'm still fleshing out my characters and plot, I'm very excited about this story.

DMc: You are a member of the Children's Writing Coaching Club. What do you find to be the most valuable aspect of the club? If you need to list more than one please do.

KS: The weekly teleseminars have taught me how to write a good children's picture book, how to get it published, and how to market it. The professional critiques have saved me lots of time in fine-tuning my books.

DMc: You are a member of VBT - Writers on the Move. Please share with our readers the concept behind this group. Where can people visit?

KS: Put your writing career in motion with this yahoo, marketing group. You can promote your platform, yourself and your books! They utilize ONGOING tours; viewpoint segments; mystery site give-aways; marketing and writing tips, blog radio spots; and much more to increase visibility and readership.


